We left HORSHAM at 0800 Hours 17 August 1945 to bomb a target at RECENSBURG, GERMANY. When we errived over AMTWENT enemy fighters All began their attack. I was helping remove ice from the ball-turnet when I heard two shells explode, As soon as I got to my gins I sen a fighter about 300 yards off. After getting in a few bursts the radio operator grabbed me by the arm and pointed to the radio room which was burning. He motioned me to bale out. I wont back to help the ball-turret guinter get out. Es was badly injured but after he put on his daute end was ready to jume I went out of the waist door head-first. My chute opened around 16000 feet. There were four other chutes in the air and the last I saw or our plane it was flying level trailing black smoke,

I landed northwest of LILLE ST HUBERT about ten miles from the German border. I threw my chute, blying boots and Mae West into a small canal and ran southwest for about an hour before stopping to rest. After that I travelled along fence lines and hedge-rows until 1700 hours. I rested and walked for short intervals during the first night end following day.

About 0300 hours 19 August 1943 I crayled into a haystack to watch a small isolated farmhouse. All day I saw no one but children so I roved my hiding place to the side of a road. Eventually an old we an came by and I
