30 Sept 44

I bailed out over Holland at about 1400 on 30 November 43 I hid that day, then went to a hospital about 15 mis SW of ROERMOND. I stayed here a few hours. The doctor was a woman whose father had been Dutch and her mother Burmese. Then I went to ROERMOND.

I stayed here 4 or 5 days with a Dutch boy. I was told to say that I had been helped by the man with the little red wagon. The police and Belgian border patrol aided in getting me across the border to MEISPELT. I went to ANTWERP and spent several days with MAICELLE MAAS, the proprietor of the Cafe de Swam.

Then I went with a guide to BRUXELLES. I was taken to the home of a British Intellixgence officer, HENRY MACA. His father was captured by the Gestapo while I was there. His sister GERMAINE always accompanied evaders when they moved from one hiding place to another.

in the MEISE (MEYSSE ?) district. M ANDRE VEIHEYDEN who had a large villa, Then was his wife and mother-in-law. His father-in-law had been a food administrator.

> Then I returned to MACA's home for 10 days. From there I went to the home of another intelligence worker. I spent 4 of 5 days with a lady and her Jewish maid. Warexixheardxthatxaxcrew*memberxxxx McDERMOTT, xhadxbeenxarrestedxbyxthaxGextapa Then I went with a crewmember, McDERMOTT, and an RCAF evader named JOE. We were taken to the home of a lady whose son is a member of the US Marines. She was from Luxembourg and her husband was an American. They were divorced. She lived in the tallest building in BRUXELLES, just opposite the Gestapo KENNERKEEKS building. alon

We stayed with Mrs PALMER 4 or 5 days. She was working. Her sister SUZANNE, who was siggle, also worked. We left McDERMOTT here and moved to southern Belgium. We were told that we were going to fly but then the Gestapo captured the underground chief with papers on him and as a result 3 American airmen were said to have been shot.

(dought and) We gathered in MACA's room at the hotel and decided to hide for several days until a new toute sould be arranged. We went to CHARLEROI where we were met by a monk.

There were 7 of us --2 Yugoslavs, 2 Belgians, a Pole, Sgt GILCREASE (E&E#23), and I. When we were told that we would be kept there for 3 months, GILVREASE and I left withwese for Switzerland. On 5 March, we took the train to the last town before the French border. We had been told there was barbed wire, mines, etc., but we stopped a man and boy on the road. They told us where the border was and changed our money for us. We walked acposs into FUMAY without any trouble.

In FUMAY we contacted a terrorist organization. They arranged to take us through to Switzerland if we would tell the American Legation shout dropping supplies to this organization. We were taken through PARIS on the train and got off at BELFORT. Where we went across the border with a group of smugglers. We entered Switzerland on 21 March The police took us to BERN, then to OLTEN for a quarantine period.

At the end of that time, we were allowed to go to the American Legation in BERNE We stayed in BERN 6 days before going to KLOSTERS. After 2 weeks, we were sent to GLICN. We remained there until 14 September when we were taken to ANNECY. Wr were flown back to the

Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and
- Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

- Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SEGRET.
- 2. You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations, or by A. C. of S., G-2, W. D.

(1) The names of those who helped you.

(2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.

(3) The route you followed.

(4) Any other facts concerning your experience.

You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.

- You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures. You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4.
- No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the theater.

GERTIFIGATE

I have read the above and certify that I will comply with it.

I understand that any information concerning my escape or evasion from capture is SEGRET and must not be disclosed to anyone other than the agency designated by A. C. of S., G-2, War Department, the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations, or to the Military Attache in a neutral country to whom I first report. I understand that disclosure to anyone else will make me liable to disciplinary action.
